Erection of the Gray Bridge started the third week of July with a very competent crew from John Camden Construction Company out of Pierceton, Indiana. They came with cranes, high lift work platforms, tools and an excellent background of working with iron bridges.



The parts needed in the erection included over one hundred individual pieces that the M-W-F volunteer crew had cleaned, repaired and straightened over the past two years. Our hardworking crew used a technique to "hammer out" vast amounts of iron oxide, called "pack rust."

Now that summer is winding down, weekend hours after Labor Day are by appointment or chance only.

A New Addition



We recently received some old railroad depot baggage wagon's gear from Shirley and Bill Willard of Rochester. They brought these remnants from the Fulton County Historical Society's surplus of railroad items. These will be restructured with oak planking by M-W-F volunteer Clay Sledd. When all three are completed one of the replicated wagons will be given back to the Historical

Society. We recently brought a RR depot building in panels and pieces from Leiter's Ford in their county. The depot was disassembled by an Amish crew with our M-W-F crew doing the hauling. Stay tuned for updates!



The completed span now supports itself from end posts on wood blocking we cut with a portable sawmill. The wood came from ash trees from the site of the foundation for the bridge.
