Darrin Rubino, a Professor of Biology from Hanover College in Madison, Indiana carefully and strategically "core samples" one of the logs in our many Pioneer Village buildings. He and a team of three including Ball State Associate Professor Christopher Bass and Technician Ross Alexander from Chicago, came to spend three days in Canal Park working to determine accurately the year each building was built. They do this by extracting a 6 inch long pencil sized sample perpendicular to the smooth underside of log bark. The year these logs were harvested in the forest to make the buildings will be determined in the laboratory later this year. Researchers identify growth rings under a microscope and compare the width of the rings with historical local weather history. More will be reported for each building with study results later this year



Here Darrin is sampling wood planks with a little noticed area where bark had been on the surface. This Speece Shelter original building's rafters from perhaps the 1840s were constructed from timbers that were donated to the Canal Association in the 1970s. They were originally part of the Speece Brothers Canal Warehouse that had been located


