Busy as bees, the M-W-F crew places cedar shingles on the roof and chinks the space between logs. Next will be the placing of "gob" (mortar) to complete the weatherizing before it can be used as the Loom House.



Inside the Gray Barn on a rainy day the M-W-F crew makes a door for the entry to the Loom House. These planks were "scabs" cut off the tulip poplar Canal Lock timbers from the 1830s. They had been in the ground for over a century and a half east of Fort Wayne. Our volunteer sawyer cut down the massive timbers to fit the spaces we needed replacement logs.

Volunteers make our popular canal boat rides possible. Here narrator Kathy McGraw is in costume as she approaches the dock. Other volunteers that run the boat (it takes two) are coordinated by Capt. Freedom Bridge Project



Too big for our M-W-F crew is the 300 foot long bridge from Freedom, Indiana. Contractors for the City of Delphi and INDOT are reassembling this span to become the pedestrian crossing over the new four lane Hoosier Heartland Highway. The trail and span follow the old railbed east a mile to finally encounter the Monon High Bridge over Deer Creek.



The long bridge in the background (on the other side of the highway) is Freedom Bridge, fully assembled on land. Placement of the span over the four lane highway by huge cranes is planned for July 8th (weather permitting). On this side is the plaza also being constructed for the City of Delphi. It will also become a starting point for hikers on the Monon Trail. Another new local organization, Heartland Heritage Incorporated (HHI), and Deer Creek Township are in agreement to continue to develop and enhance the trail portion owned by the Canal Association. Ultimately the trail will include a Deer Creek overlook utilizing the 1880s Monon trestle as well.
