The finsihed panel highlighting the Railroad Depot is in its permainent place overlooking the canal. As the story goes the railroads took over the business of transportaion by the 1870s leaving the canals to fail and fall apart. Here in Canal Park that story is being told by having buildings and facilities that illustrate this transition.



Brice Crowel, one of the M-W-F crew is mortaring limestone pieces to form a solid foundation for the newest building in Canal Park. The site will become the simblance of an 1830s canal workers shanty and will be made from logs salvaged by the crew from a log barn near Bringhurst last summer.
