At the back of this 1860s log building is MWF volunteer Larry Batta working. He is putting "gob" (mortar) into the cracks between the logs. The building was moved from the Bringhurst area on an Ayres Farm utilizing monetary assistance from a grant approved last year by two Lafayette organizations known as Tippecanoe Arts Federation (TAF) and funding from North Central Health Services (NCHS).

installing a restrictive gate made out of native materials. Access to the popular canal side trail by hikers is encouraged but not vehicles.



Indiana Canal Society supported the production of four marking signs to be placed near original sites where dam raised the water level of the Wabash River thus directing a controlled flow into the mainline canal upstream from the mill town of Pittsburg. This bustling town hosted at that time the furthest downstream of four Wabash River dam sites. The other Wabash dams were at Logansport, Peru and Huntington.



This beautiful historic building is owned by Jim and June Davis who have supported canal projects many times. It was once a water powered mill in the middle of what's now sleepy little town of Pittsburg. It's across the river from Delphi.

The Canal Boat cruises on July 6-7 take passengers on a 40 minute narrated ride through a beautiful mile of this restored waterway. For passengers holding pre-paid tickets their boat leaves the dock on the hour from 11-3 p.m. Note that buying a "combo ticket" is a bargain.

In Delphi's earlier days thousands of barrels were produced. They were used for shipping lime, salt cured pork and other goods. Here in Pioneer Village we have our own Cooper Shop where buckets, barrels and butter churns are made. Come see the Cooper at work in his shop.



A month ago the Canal Association presented Pioneer Kids Day. Many things to do for kids as well as adults. Linda Cooper, Program Director, worked with Karen Bradshaw, Beverly Seese, Janet Ayres and other key volunteers to produce unique 1850s era things to experience.
